

Poisonous animals 1.3 Common Krait

<u>Scientific Name</u>: Bungarus caeruleus. <u>Other Common Names</u>: Indian krait. <u>Geographical Distribution</u>: All over India.

Identification:

The common krait is a steel-blue snake growing up to 3 to 4 feet in length (sometimes up to 7 feet), with whitish bands or half-rings throughout its back.

The most distinctive features comprise the following:

- 1. A chain of hexagonal large scales throughout the middorsal aspect of the body
- 2. The subcaudals (ventral scales distal to the vent) are undivided, unlike other elapids
- 3. The 4th infralabial scale is the largest of the infralabials.

<u>Nature of Venom</u>: Predominantly **neurotoxic**. It is the most venomous snake of India.

Antidote: Antisnake venom (ASV)
